Pay attention to differences across job roles, departments, and schedules. Don't forget to factor in seasonal changes. In regions with harsh winters, commuting patterns can shift dramatically, with weather impacting driving safety and transit reliability.

## Identify Cost and Time Challenges

Use your survey data to calculate the full cost of commuting for employees, including transportation expenses, parking fees, and time spent traveling. These costs often go beyond dollars - long commutes can lead to stress and lost productivity.

# Choosing the Right Transportation Solutions
